

THE LESSON WITHIN LONELINESS

Soren Kierkegaard could be called the patron saint of the lonely.



Søren Aabye Kierkegaard was a Danish theologian, philosopher, poet, social critic, and religious author who is widely considered to be the first existentialist philosopher.

Born: 5 May 1813, Copenhagen, Denmark

Died: 11 November 1855, Copenhagen, Denmark

As a young man, Soren Kierkegaard renounced marriage to someone he was engaged to. Rightly or wrongly, he felt that

what he had to give to the world was rooted inside the pain of his own loneliness and could only issue forth from that center and, if he was less lonely, he would have less to give.

Was he right? He confessed that he lived the curse "of never to be allowed to let anyone deeply and inwardly join themselves to me." Thomas Merton, commenting on the same thing, once said that the absence of married intimacy in his life constituted "a fault in my chastity." This kind of depth comes at a price.

Why, despite such an obvious downside, are the Kierkegaards of our world drawn to loneliness in the belief that it holds the key to depth, empathy, and wisdom? What does loneliness do for us?

What loneliness does for us, especially very intense loneliness, is destabilize the ego and make it too fragile to sustain us in the normal way. What happens then is that we begin to unravel, feel ourselves become unglued, become aware of our smallness, and know in the roots of our being that we need to connect to something larger than ourselves to survive. But that's a very painful experience and we tend to flee from it.

However, and this is a great paradox, this experience of intense loneliness is one of the privileged ways of finding the deep answer to our quest for identity and meaning. Because it destabilizes the ego and disorients us, loneliness puts us in touch with what lays below the ego, namely, the soul, our deepest self. The image and likeness of God lies in there, as do our most noble and divine energies. That's the truth behind the belief that in loneliness there is depth.

The lesson is this, whether married or single: Don't run from loneliness. Don't see it as your enemy. Don't look for another person to cure your loneliness. See loneliness as a privileged avenue to depth and empathy.

60 YEARS A CHRISTIAN BROTHER

1963-2023

Wilfy, sixty years ago we saw you leave a loving home and family only to be welcomed into another - the Christian

When you entered Mt. Carmel, Kurseong, few would have imagined that this young man, deceptively simple, naïve and afraid of non-existent 'flying leeches' would play such a significant role in the life and governance of the Province and Congregation.

Early in your life as a Brother you displayed traits such as self-belief, crafty diplomacy, composure, punctuality, flair for administration and stickler for rules, which you no doubt inherited from your father. With time, you honed these many talents into fine skills, which you used most effectively when dealing with troublesome parents, officious Government bureaucrats, and even pompous clergy and hierarchy. You were "shrewd for the sake of the Kingdom of God", but never unfair or hurtful. You are "an original blessing" for the Province when financial, administrative or obstructive crises crop up.

Life dealt you many seemingly unfair blows in the form of both bereavements and serious health concerns. Early in life, in a short period you lost two young siblings and your father. It took all the love of your family, confrere's support, and your own resilience to enable you to deal with these losses in an exemplary way.

Later in life, you had to deal with serious and permanent health issues, which necessitated frequent visits to doctors and hospitals. You accepted these setbacks with a stoic calmness, which stemmed from a lifelong surrender to and acceptance of God's Will in your life.

You refused to let these adversities constrain or discourage you. On the contrary, you continue to accept appointments and burdensome tasks. On your frequent trips across the country, you do what you do best - conduct meetings, solve problems, dispense sound advice, and energize yourself for your next trip! Your positivity, humour and zest for life remains undiminished.

Your life is totally unostentatious. In community life and prayer, rules and traditions matter, though you are not averse to bending these when required. You enjoy company, but are more at ease on a one-on-one basis. Many a time have you asked if you could, "Drop in for a chat", with a definite emphasis on the 'drop'. You also earned yourself the affectionate moniker, "The Whacker", given your propensity to

appropriate others' everyday possessions, presuming tacit permission. Moreover, no Brother can recall an occasion when you reached into your pocket for your purse when a waiter presented a bill. No one resents these little quirks; they only add to the colourful and likeable character you are.

Wilfy, right from your school days you have always ensured that you stayed a step ahead of others. We recall the time in St. Columba's when you were able to manoeuvre a "double promotion" from Standard three to five, leaving your classmates bemused and a little envious.

Your diplomacy and shrewdness leave many to regard you as a person who follows someone through a revolving door, but exits before him!

We rejoice with you Wilfy and give thanks to God for you as we celebrate your 60 Years of service to the Province and the Congregation. May God reward you with happiness and good health.

In conclusion, we quote a few personal opinions expressed by some of your Brothers:

"With his gusto for life, one can hardly guess that he is living on borrowed time. His positive outlook enables him to tide over many a health crisis. Such an appetite for life can only come from his deep relationship with the one Life that matters --- with Jesus --- to whom he has committed his life the last 60 years."

"He always encouraged me and helped me to feel at home and I don't think we ever had a row. Wilfie always won anyway so what would be the point in arguing! I have been so blessed to have had Wilfie there, walking behind me, supporting and encouraging me in his own inimitable way. I owe him so much in my Indian incarnation."

"Wilfie was the first Christian Brother I spoke to in my life and also my first CB teacher. I am grateful to him for dragging me out of the class when I was late for study one morning; but instead of scolding me for being late, he asked me to join the Brothers! This simple gesture did change my life."

"The most important aspect of your work and ministry has been relationships. You have been able to form bonds of friendship, trust, and support with a large number of people. You are gifted with the one skill that is needed: the gift of love and faithfulness in that love".

"I often accuse Wilfie of being a big 'bluff', never associating himself with spirituality. Religion, yes. He is totally unostentatious when it comes to a deep and letting go surrender to his poor health dealing with a very weak heart, cancer and a host of other debilitating illnesses. This, Wilfie faces in silence, surrender, and quiet reflection and may I add hard work and travel. Wilfie is a saint in my estimation. This statement might jolt the Province. Not me!"





PATHARLYNDAN

The students in Patharlyndan began their new academic year in the month of February. The elections for the Meghalaya Assembly have forced the schools to closed down as the teachers are helping in election booths and other duties, in the smooth conduct of the elections.

Iatreilang Edmund Rice Youth Action group held an orientation as well as to become familiar with the terrain of Lum Laudato Si to take the tree planting activities forward.









Two field workers, Bah Tobias Jana and Balawansuk interacted with the youth to explain to them the importance of harmonious living with nature. Meghalaya BASIN Development visited Patharlyndan in January, to involve the local people in Micro planning exercise to address Climate Change initiatives. The BASIN Development personnel checked forest cover in the area. Water sources were identified to build check dams to preserve water.

The recently formed Iatreilang Dairy Cooperative Society is taking a step forward by keeping 10 high milk yield cows as their livelihood. The Dairy Milk Mission of Meghalaya has sanctioned an interest free loan to start this venture. This is a small beginning for the people to take another initiative forward.

A group of Ex-pupils of SMO, Dum Dum visited our village with Br. William Dsouza. They interacted with some students attending Computer classes as well as the field workers. They even climbed the Lum Laudato Si' and saw for themselves the advocacy initiated by the Brothers and the village leadership.

UMTYRKHANG

While Jerry and Ajay were on home leave, Edwin assisted a few children of the village studying outside with some remedial teaching of English, Maths and Science in the month of Jan.

In the third week of Jan a couple of youth attended a week's training in the Hub on basic teaching skills for the lower primary classes. It was heartening to see the progress made at the end of the week by the two who were very raw at the start of it. Thanks to Sr. Baiada, a Loreto nun working in South Sudan who had come on home leave for being generous with her time for imparting the necessary skills and to Sunil for all the hard work in putting this training together.

On the 25th of January we had the good news of the second sow delivering 9 piglets with the piggery project that the Brothers are involved in with a SHG group. We would be assisting another 3 families of the village with the piglets.

Even though we had majority of the chicks (of Rainbow breed) dying at the beginning of the project last year, the ones that survived are doing very well and in the last two months we have been able to

collect 260 eggs from the 8 chickens. People are now buying some eggs from the Brothers in order to try out the same in their houses.

In the month of February, we received the spawns for the mushroom cultivation and been distributed to the trainees who attended the training along with Jerry and Ajay. The Brothers are also trying it to see it's variability as another source of income for the villagers.

Because of the teachers being involved in the election duty, the reopening of the schools and teaching has been delayed in the 3 villages. Hopefully, post elections regular teaching will take place.
